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## Chapter 1

# Introduction

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## 1.1 Acknowledgement to Country

The Central Coast Bush Fire Management Committee (BFMC) acknowledges and pays respect to the Traditional Owners of the lands on which we work, and the lands we travel through. We also acknowledge our Elders – past, present and emerging.

## 1.2 Introduction

A Bush Fire Risk Management Plan (BFRMP) provides information on the bush fire risks within your community. It also outlines how land managers along with fire authorities are going to effectively manage those risks through implementing various treatment strategies.

The development of a BFRMP is a legal requirement under section 52 of the *Rural Fires Act 1997* (NSW) (the Act). The BFRMP, including the accompanying appendices and spatial data, is prepared by Central Coast BFMC and is approved by the Bush Fire Coordinating Committee (BFCC).

A BFRMP is a strategic document that identifies community assets and values that may be at risk from bush fire and identifies coordinated multi-agency objectives and associated treatment strategies to reduce the risk over a five year period. Treatment strategies may include such actions as hazard reduction burning, mechanical clearing, targeted community engagement programs and ignition prevention activities. The treatment strategies are implemented by the member agencies / organisation of the BFMC and are monitored and reported on an ongoing basis.

This document (including its appendices) and the accompanying maps form the BFRMP for the Central Coast BFMC area. It covers both public and private land and is to be reviewed and monitored annually.

This BFRMP is applied in conjunction with the BFMC's Fire Access and Fire Trail (FAFT) Plan and Operations Coordination Plan to provide a comprehensive approach to risk mitigation and operational preparedness.

## 1.3 Aim and objectives

The aim of this BFRMP is to reduce the risk of adverse impacts of bush fires on life, property, infrastructure and environmental, economic, cultural, agricultural and community assets.

The objectives of this BFRMP are to:

- Objective 1:** Reduce the number of human-induced bush fire ignitions and their potential to cause damage to life, property, infrastructure and environmental, economic, cultural, agricultural and community assets.
- Objective 2:** Manage fuel to reduce the rate of spread, intensity and impact of bush fires on life and assets while minimising damage to environmental and cultural values.
- Objective 3:** Increase the community's resilience to bush fires by improving its preparedness, response and recovery.
- Objective 4:** Provide advice and strategies to plan, prepare and implement activities to effectively contain fires with the potential to cause damage to life, property, infrastructure and environmental, economic, cultural, agricultural and community assets.

## 1.4 The Planning Process

The Australia/New Zealand Standard AS/NZS 31000: 2018 Risk Management was used to guide the bush fire risk assessment process. This is outlined in Figure 1 below.

## Chapter 2

# Risk Assessment

## 2.1 Assets

An asset is something that is valued by the community. There are four main categories of assets considered in the BFRMP, each with subcategories.

### 2.1.1 Human settlement

- Residential areas including urban-bushland interface areas and rural properties; and
- Special Fire Protection areas including schools, hospitals, nursing homes, and tourist facilities.

### 2.1.2 Economic

- Agricultural - includes crops, bulk grain storage, grazing, horticulture, intensive animal production, livestock, fencing and major machinery sheds;
- Commercial - includes commercial services, Defence facilities, research facilities and ports and water transport;
- Electrical - including transmission lines, substations and electricity generation plants;
- Forestry assets – native forests, hardwood and softwood plantations;
- Industrial - includes general purpose factories, food processing factories, major industrial complexes, abattoirs, oil refineries and sawmills;
- Infrastructure – airports, communication towers, roads, railways, waste treatment plants, water treatment plants;
- Mining - combustible, non-combustible and underground;
- Recreational – community recreation facilities and major sporting and recreation complexes; and
- Water catchments.

### 2.1.3 Environmental

- Threatened Flora and Fauna – includes iconic species such as koalas and the Wollemi pine, threatened species, threatened ecological communities (TECs), and threatened populations at risk of extinction in NSW;
- Fire sensitive vegetation communities – includes regulated wetlands, RAMSAR wetlands and rainforest vegetation communities;
- Land covered by statutory conservation and biodiversity agreements;
- World Heritage and national and state heritage listed areas;
- Land with geological significance – includes land with high erosion potential, or geotechnical risk, karst landscapes and sand dunes;

- Environmentally significant land identified by an Environmental Planning Instrument - including Local Environment Plans (LEPs) and State Environmental Planning Polices (SEPPs); and
- Other locally important assets – including vegetation identified as bush fire refugia, bush regeneration areas and Assets of Intergenerational Significance (AIS).

Note: not all of these assets have quantitative risk assessment methodologies.

#### 2.1.4 Cultural

- Aboriginal heritage – including items recorded in the Aboriginal Heritage Information Management System and predictive site locations from the Aboriginal Sites Decision Support Tool (ASDST);
- Non-Indigenous cultural heritage – items and places from the State Heritage Inventory, Section 170 Heritage and Conservation Register and the Historic Heritage Information Management System.

Assets across all four categories have been identified using geographic information system (GIS) data including land use classifications and cadastre (Lot boundaries), as well as local knowledge.

## 2.2 Neighbourhood Safer Places

A Neighbourhood Safer Place (NSP) is defined by section 62C of the *Rural Fires Act 1997* as “land or a building designated as a neighbourhood safer place”. NSPs provide a place of last resort for people during a bush fire. All designated NSP locations for NSW are available at [www.rfs.nsw.gov.au](http://www.rfs.nsw.gov.au).

The Central Coast BFMC considered the number and location of Neighbourhood Safer Places (NSPs) within the BFMC area. All NSPs in Central Coast BFMC area require ongoing treatment by the applicable land owner to ensure that the asset remains viable as a place of last resort for people during a bush fire. Therefore, all NSPs within the BFMC area are required to be treated and have been included in the Fuel Management Register.

## 2.3 Risk Identification and Analysis

This BFRMP is underpinned by a risk quantification methodology based on fire behaviour modelling (Phoenix RapidFire). The fire simulation process applies an ignition model, local historical weather and historical fire information to determine where fires are most likely to occur in the landscape. A Bayesian Decision Network model is used to quantify the bush fire risk to each asset in the landscape based on relevant vulnerability criteria.

Bush fire risks may also be identified during the process from qualitative assessment methodologies. For example where expert local knowledge identifies a significant area of concern, challenges in firefighting or locally significant values.

The risk maps for each asset category are provided in Appendix 3.

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## Chapter 3

# Treating Risk

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### 3.1 Treatments

The purpose of risk treatment is to reduce the likelihood and/or harmful consequences of bush fire to the community and environment, through a process of selecting and implementing risk treatment options that modify the characteristics of the hazard, the community or the environment. There are three types of treatments considered in the BFRMP:

1. BFMC Wide Treatments;
2. Focus Area Treatments; and
3. Fuel Management Treatments.

BFMC members and land managers routinely implement risk treatment strategies in accordance with legislative requirements, policy and asset management. For example, vegetation management, restrictions on development in bush fire prone areas, bush fire education and fire suppression activities. We refer to these as BFMC Wide Treatments. These activities occur outside the BFRMP and reduce the bush fire risk to assets and communities throughout the BFMC area.

The risk assessment process applied in this BFRMP assists BFMCs in identifying strategic Fuel Management Treatments and Focus Area Treatments.

Fuel Management Treatments include hazard reduction burns and vegetation clearing. These are designed to protect life, property and the environment from intense bush fires. While they will not completely stop bush fires from starting and spreading, these treatments can help protect firefighters, assist with containment strategies and reduce the potential damage to community assets and environmental values.

Focus Areas are groups of assets in the landscape that the BFMC has identified as having significant or unacceptable risk. The BFMC has specifically identified Focus Area Treatments for these areas and they prioritise these treatments over all others.

#### 3.1.1 BFMC Wide Treatments

BFMC wide treatments are activities which are undertaken to reduce the overall bush fire risk within the BFMC area.

The following table identifies the BFMC wide treatments applicable to the Central Coast BFMC area.

TREATMENT	DESCRIPTION
<b>Plan of Operations</b>	Under Part 3 Division 4 Sections 52 and 53 of the <i>Rural Fires Act 1997</i> , BFMCs are required to prepare and submit to the BFCC a Plan of Operations and must review the Plan every two years. The Plan of Operations details the co-ordinated firefighting arrangements and fire management practices and ensures that each BFMC member is able to execute its role and specific responsibilities.
<b>Treatments in the Fire Access and Fire Trail Plan Treatment Register</b>	<p>Under section 52 of the Act, BFMCs must develop a Fire Access and Fire Trail (FAFT) Plan for their area and must review the FAFT Plan every five years.</p> <p>Fire trails are an important part of ensuring firefighters can access fires and safely contain them. Fire trails may also be used as fire control lines for hazard reduction burns, however this is not their primary purpose.</p> <p>In accordance with the NSW RFS Fire Trail Standards the BFMC may prepare a Treatment Register which sets out a schedule of works for the construction and maintenance of fire trails. The Standards provide that the Treatment Register is updated annually and typically forms part of a FAFT Plan.</p> <p>Treatments contained within the FAFT Plan Treatment Register (as amended from time to time) are BFMC Wide Treatments under this BFRMP.</p>
<b>Ignition Prevention Plan</b>	The BFMC will develop an Ignition Prevention Plan (IPP). The purpose of the IPP is to provide firefighting authorities, NSW Police and Local Authorities with localised strategies to prevent ignitions. In particular, deliberate or careless ignitions and illegal fires.
<b>Land &amp; Asset Management</b>	There are organisational plans, standard policies, Regulations and procedures for the management of assets and/or land managed by BFMC members. For example vegetation clearance around power lines, maintenance of public land, and agency-specific fire management plans.
<b>Local Environmental Plans</b>	<p>Local Environmental Plans (LEPs) guide planning decisions for local government areas. They do this through zoning and development controls, which provide a framework for the way land can be used.</p> <p>LEPs can be used to exclude development in significant bush fire risk areas or in areas where bush fire protection measures cannot be incorporated.</p>
<b>Environmental Approval for all Hazard Reduction</b>	Land management agencies will obtain environmental approval (through the Bush Fire Environmental Assessment Code, or other approval process) to undertake any activities that have the potential to impact the environment e.g. hazard reduction burning or vegetation removal. The environmental assessment process considers flora, fauna, threatened species, cultural assets, soil erosion, riparian areas, biodiversity fire regimes, weeds and air pollution (smoke).
<b>Bush Fire Prone Land Mapping and Planning for Bush Fire Protection</b>	<p>Section 10.3 of the <i>Environmental Planning &amp; Assessment Act 1979</i> requires the land subject to a BFRMP to be mapped in accordance with Guide for Bush Fire Prone Land Mapping. Bush Fire Prone Land Maps are used as a trigger mechanism to ensure that new development is approved in accordance with Planning for Bush Fire Protection (PBP).</p> <p>PBP sets planning specifications which aim to increase the likelihood of structures surviving a bush fire, and in combination with Australian Standard 3959 Building in Bush Fire Prone Areas which specifies building standards.</p> <p>All new development on Bush Fire Prone Land will be assessed in accordance with PBP.</p>

<b>Hazard complaints</b>	<p>It is the duty of land owners to prevent the occurrence of bush fires on, and to minimise the danger of the spread of bush fires on or from, their land.</p> <p>Under section 66 of the <i>Rural Fires Act 1997</i>, a Bush Fire Hazard Reduction Notice can be issued, directing a hazard be removed. This Notice can be issued to private and public landowners. If the Bush Fire Hazard Reduction Notice is not complied with, the NSW RFS will remove the hazard, and may pursue the cost from the landowner.</p> <p>Under Section 73 and Section 74E of the Act, the NSW RFS Commissioner may direct hazard reduction works to be undertaken.</p>
<b>Community engagement</b>	<p>This includes state-wide public awareness initiatives as well as local community interactions between fire agencies, land managers and local communities.</p>
<b>BFMC Bush Fire Danger Period</b>	<p>The <i>Rural Fires Act 1997</i> sets the statutory Bush Fire Danger Period.</p> <p>A Fire Permit is required for burning activities during the Bush Fire Danger Period in Rural Fire districts and at all times in Fire and Rescue (FRNSW) districts around the state.</p> <p>Fire Permits help ensure fire is used safely during the Bush Fire Danger Period. A permit imposes conditions on the way a fire is lit and maintained, and can only be issued by authorised Permit Issuing Officers.</p> <p>The permit provides landholders who intend to burn, with the conditions they are to adhere with to ensure adequate and appropriate measures are in place, and that fires remain under control.</p>
<b>Firefighting response</b>	<p>All firefighting authorities in NSW have legislation, regulations, policies and procedures for responding to bush fire events within their area of jurisdiction.</p>
<b>Prosecution of arsonists / offenders</b>	<p>Under the <i>Rural Fires Act 1997</i> persons may be prosecuted for a range of offences. These offences include:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>• deliberately setting fire to the land of another person without consent;</li> <li>• lighting a fire without notifying the relevant authority;</li> <li>• breaching the conditions on a fire permit;</li> <li>• lighting a fire during a Total Fire Ban;</li> <li>• allowing fire to escape their property; or</li> <li>• other breaches of the Act.</li> </ul>

### 3.1.2 Fuel Management Treatments

Hazard reduction is an important component of managing bush fire risk. Hazard reduction involves removing or reducing the fuel (vegetation) in order to modify the potential fire behaviour, to reduce extreme bush fire behaviour and associated impact to firefighters and to community assets and values, to assist in fire suppression and to enable appropriate fire regimes to be implemented.

The BFRMP Fuel Management Register is a list of hazard reduction activities that the Central Coast BFMC has identified as strategic treatments in the BFRMP. The fuel management treatments include prescribed burns, vegetation removal in BFMC-managed asset protection zones and the development or maintenance of fire breaks.

All hazard reduction activities listed in the Fuel Management Register are proposed to be completed within the five-year term of BFRMP, however, those activities that are linked to a Focus Area will be treated as a priority. The occurrence of bush fires will necessitate annual revision and reprioritisation of the treatment schedules.

See Appendix 2 for the Central Coast BFMC Fuel Management Register.

### 3.1.3 Focus Area Treatments

The management of bush fire risks involves a coordinated approach from fire authorities, landowners, land managers, planning authorities, local councils and the community. Even with the combined resources of these stakeholders, it is still not possible or practical to actively treat all bush fire risks across the landscape. It is therefore important for communities and BFMCs to determine what areas will form the focus for the application of specific treatment strategies in this BFRMP.

Focus Areas were determined through an analysis of the quantitative risk assessment data, but also consider factors such as the social vulnerability of the community, access and egress and local significance.

There are eight Focus Areas within the Central Coast BFRMP. These are:

- Seahampton to Wakefeld
- Whitebridge to Dudley
- Cooranbong to Martinsville
- Jililby to Lemon Tree
- Ourimbah to Matcham
- Somersby to Peats Ridge
- Mount White to Calga
- Phegans Bay to Pearl Beach

These are areas that have been specifically identified as having an unacceptable risk and require additional, targeted treatment strategies within the five-year BFRMP.

There are four key objectives available to manage the bush fire risk to Focus Areas and each objective has a number of associated treatment strategies (Table 2). The BFMC has identified the most appropriate objectives and treatment strategies for each Focus Area. The Focus Area treatment strategies selected by the BFMC will be addressed annually as part of the BFMC Annual Works Program.

## 3.2 Bush Fire Management Zones

Bush Fire Management Zones identified within the Central Coast BFMC area have been mapped as part of the Fuel Management Register. These zones identify the fire management intent for a specific area. The five categories of Bush Fire Management Zones are:

- Asset Protection Zone (APZ);
- Strategic Fire Advantage Zone (SFAZ);
- Ignition Management Zone (IMZ);
- Land Management Zone (LMZ); and
- Fire Exclusion Zone (FEZ).

See Annexure C of BFCC Policy 01/2023 for further information on Bush Fire Management Zones including a description of the zones and their purposes.

## 3.3 Relationship with other Plans

Under section 52 of the *Rural Fires Act 1997*, each BFMC must prepare and submit to the Bush Fire Coordinating Committee a draft of each of the following:

- A bush fire management plan (defined to be both a BFRMP and a fire access and fire treatment plan (FAFT Plan)); and
- A Plan of Operations.

These BFMC planning documents should complement each other, however, a FAFT Plan prevails over the BFRMP to the extent of any inconsistency in accordance with section 59A(4) of the Act.

Treatments contained within the FAFT Plan Treatment Register (as amended from time to time) are BFMC Wide Treatments under this BFRMP.

Additionally, an Ignition Prevention Plan will be prepared for the BFMC. Other plans such as Community Protection Plans, agency specific Fire Management Strategies, or private property fire plans may be prepared, however as this BFRMP has been prepared in accordance with the Act, all other plans are subordinate to it.

## Chapter 4

# Communication and Consultation

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## 4.1 Communication and Consultation

Community participation is an integral part of risk management. The BFMC undertook consultation with the community during the development phase of the BFRMP as outlined in Appendix 4. The Communication Strategy involved developing and implementing a process to address the needs, issues and concerns of stakeholders within the BFMC area in regards to the BFRMP. This involved member agencies engaging with their stakeholders to ensure their views are represented in the BFRMP and that they understand their own responsibility in risk management.

In accordance with section 57 of the *Rural Fires Act 1997*, the draft BFRMP was placed on public exhibition to provide an opportunity for the community to have formal input, and that input has been taken into account and reflected in the BFRMP.

This plan will be available from the RFS web site and must also be available for public inspection at, and be able to be obtained free of charge from, the office of the local authority for the area to which it relates during ordinary office hours.

## Chapter 5

# Performance Monitoring and Review

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## 5.1 Monitoring and Review

This BFRMP must be reviewed and updated within each successive five-year period from the constitution of the BFMC. The Central Coast BFMC will also review this BFRMP as necessary to account for any changes in context or risk on account of changes to the BFMC area, organisational responsibilities or legislation; changes to the bush fire risk in the area; changes to the Treatment Register; or following a major fire event.

The BFMC is required to monitor progress towards the completion of treatment works listed in the BFRMP, and the timeliness of the works. This is done through an Annual Works Program and also an Annual Report. The BFRMP may also be audited at the request of the NSW RFS Commissioner or the BFCC.

## Seahampton to Wakefield

### Risk Profile Seahampton to Wakefield

The Central Coast Bush Fire Management Committee (BFMC) has assessed the risk to residential, special fire protection (schools, health facilities, childcare etc.), economic, environmental and cultural assets and has identified Seahampton to Wakefield as a Focus Area.

The focus area encompasses the suburbs of Seahampton, West Wallsend, Holmesville, Barnsley, Killingworth and Wakefield which are in the Lake Macquarie Local Government Area. It has a diverse population with a mix of urban and rural communities.

The area has a history of bush fire ignition and there is potential for rapid fire development within the adjacent bushland. Significant bush fires have occurred in the focus area in 2013, 2016, 2018 and 2019. There is potential that bush fires in the surrounding area could impact on the urban interface, rural residential assets, economic assets such as the Killingworth Transgrid Newcastle 330/132 kV Substation, Mount Sugarloaf group of Telecommunications Infrastructure (just west of the focus area) and major roadways, including the M1 Pacific Motorway, M15 Hunter Expressway and other arterial road networks.

A number of residential homes, properties and economic assets (industrial, commercial and tourism) have been identified in the high risk category. There are also social vulnerability and demographic factors including multicultural backgrounds, education levels, disability and urban growth (new residents moving into the area) that may make the community more vulnerable to the impacts of bush fire.

Bush fire is a key threatening process for many environmental assets. There is a risk that a high severity bush fire event in the area could cause serious damage or irreversible loss of habitat for 48 Threatened Species of fauna and flora including the Critically Endangered Regent Honeyeater (*Anthochaera Phrygia*) and the Endangered Koala (*Phascolarctos cinereus*) with part of the focus area falling within the Lower Hunter Area of Regional Koala Significance (ARKS). Within the focus area there are also 11 Threatened Ecological Communities at risk including two areas of Critically Endangered Kincumber Scribbly Gum Forest and pockets of endangered Swamp Sclerophyll Forests on coastal floodplains. There are also 9 Save our Species (SoS) program sites at risk including the Swift Parrot (*Lathamus discolor*), Native Guava (*Rhodomyrtus psidioides*) and the Scrub Turpentine (*Rhodamnia rubescens*).

There is a risk that bush fires could negatively impact on the cultural values of 49 Aboriginal sites and other cultural landscapes within the Focus area including the Butterfly Cave at West Wallsend, a sacred Aboriginal site used for generations by Awabakal women for cultural practices and sacred women's business. There are also 47 local heritage sites at risk in the focus area including early settlement buildings and timber and mining sites around West Wallsend and the historic O'Donelltown settlement.

### Risk Profile Seahampton to Wakefield (continued)

A key BFMC objective in the Seahampton to Wakefield Focus Area is Community Preparedness. The BFMC will aim to increase and improve people’s awareness and understanding of their bush fire risk through advertising campaigns and engagement at local events. Treatments will encourage people to take action to prepare their home and property for bush fire through the maintenance of private property Asset Protection Zones and the preparation of bush fire survival plans.

As identified in the Fuel Management Register, The BFMC will maintain Asset Protection Zones and implement prescribed burning to achieve different fire management objectives including strategic fire protection and land and biodiversity management.

The BFMC will work to address the high number of deliberate and accidental bush fire ignitions with specific strategies in the BFMC Ignition Prevention Plan.

To increase resilience within the focus area the BFMC will identify specific operational response strategies, develop pre incident plans for assets and areas of concern, and investigate new locations for additional Neighbourhood Safer Places of last resort.

While every effort is made to maintain Asset Protection Zones and plan, prepare and conduct prescribed burning as described in the Fuel Management Register, the BFMC acknowledge the weather and environmental factors such as vegetation types, geography, presence of threatened flora and fauna, fire intervals and wildfires can impact the time frames and feasibility of delivering Fuel Management Objectives.

The key Bush Fire Risk Management Plan Objectives and Treatment Strategies for the Seahampton to Wakefield Focus Area are listed in Table 1.

## Whitebridge to Redhead

### Risk Profile Whitebridge to Redhead

The Central Coast Bush Fire Management Committee (BFMC) has assessed the risk to residential, special fire protection (schools, health facilities, childcare etc.), economic, environmental and cultural assets and has identified Whitebridge to Redhead as a Focus Area.

The focus area encompasses the suburbs of Whitebridge, Dudley and Redhead which are in the Lake Macquarie Local Government Area. Redhead is a coastal community adjacent to Redhead Beach. It is a popular tourist destination and as such has a large transient population during the summer months at several holiday and tourist parks. Access and egress is limited to Kalaroo Road to the south and Redhead Road to the north. Dudley and Whitebridge are leafy suburbs surrounded by bushland areas including private property, Crown Lands, Council reserves, Glenrock State Conservation Area and Awabakal Nature Reserve. Access and egress is via a number of main roads including Oakdale Road, Dudley Road and Burwood Road.

The vegetation across the focus area is largely a mix of Dry Sclerophyll Forest, Wet Sclerophyll Forest and Coastal Heath. State Environmental Planning Policy (SEPP) listed Coastal Wetlands and Littoral Rainforests are located within Glenrock State Conservation area and the Awabakal Nature Reserve. These forest types can make conducting prescribed burns in these reserves challenging. Significant bush fires have occurred in the focus area in 2013 and 2019.

A number of residential homes, properties and economic assets (industrial, commercial and tourism) have been identified in the high risk category. There are also social vulnerability and demographic factors such as age, assistance, household incomes and car ownership levels that may make the community more vulnerable to the impacts of bush fire.

Bush fire is a key threatening process for many environmental assets. There is a risk that a high severity bush fire event in the area would cause serious damage or irreversible loss of habitat for 49 Threatened Species of fauna and flora including the Critically Endangered Regent Honeyeater (*Anthochaera Phrygia*) and the Critically Endangered Scrub Turpentine (*Rhodamnia rubescens*). Within the focus area there are also 20 Threatened Ecological Communities at risk including the Critically Endangered Kincumber Scribbly Gum Forest, Critically Endangered Eastern Suburbs Banksia Scrub and Critically Endangered Hygrocybeae (Fungi) Ecological Communities. There are also 21 Save our Species (SoS) program sites at risk including Hunter Estuary and NSW Coastal bird life.

There is a risk that bush fires could negatively impact on the cultural values of 79 Aboriginal sites and other cultural landscapes within the Focus area. There are also 22 heritage sites listed site at risk in the focus area including World War II Defence emplacements and the State Heritage listed Glenrock early coal mining sites.

**Risk Profile Whitebridge to Redhead (continued)**

A key BFMC objective in the Whitebridge to Redhead Focus Area is Community Preparedness. The BFMC will aim to increase and improve people’s awareness and understanding of their bush fire risk through advertising campaigns and engagement at local events. Treatments will encourage people to take action to prepare their home and property for bush fire through the maintenance of private property Asset Protection Zones and the preparation of bush fire survival plans.

As identified in the Fuel Management Register, The BFMC will maintain Asset Protection Zones and implement prescribed burning to achieve different fire management objectives including strategic fire protection, land management, and biodiversity management.

While every effort is made to maintain Asset Protection Zones and plan, prepare and conduct prescribed burning as described in the Fuel Management Register, the BFMC acknowledge that weather and environmental factors such as vegetation types, geography, presence of threatened flora and fauna, fire intervals and nearby wildfires can impact the time frames and feasibility of delivering Fuel Management Objectives.

The key Bush Fire Risk Management Plan Objectives and Treatment Strategies for the Whitebridge to Redhead Focus Area are listed in Table 2.

## Cooranbong to Martinsville

### Risk Profile Cooranbong to Martinsville

The Central Coast Bush Fire Management Committee (BFMC) has assessed the risk to residential, special fire protection (schools, health facilities, childcare etc.), economic, environmental and cultural assets and has identified Cooranbong to Martinsville as a Focus Area.

The focus area encompasses the suburbs of Cooranbong and Martinsville which are in the Lake Macquarie Local Government Area. Cooranbong is a busy urban centre with expanding housing estates and the Avondale University Campus located nearby. There are also many larger lots and hobby farms in the surrounding fringes and foothills. Martinsville valley extends west from Cooranbong with Martinsville Road being the main access and egress for residents with numerous large lot rural acreage properties surrounded by the hills and forests of the Watagan Mountains.

The area has a history of bush fire ignition and significant potential for rapid fire development which could cause negative outcomes for people, assets and local roads. The vegetation across the focus area is largely a mix of Dry Sclerophyll Forests, Wet Sclerophyll Forests, Forested wetland and open managed grassland. Significant bush fires have occurred in the focus area in 2019.

A number of residential homes, properties and economic assets (industrial, commercial and tourism) have been identified in the very high risk category. There are also social vulnerability and demographic factors of household growth, age, assistance and multicultural backgrounds that may make the community more vulnerable to the impacts of bush fire.

Bush fire is a key threatening process for many environmental assets. There is a risk that a high severity bush fire event in the area would cause serious damage or irreversible loss of habitat for 58 Threatened Species of fauna and flora including the Critically Endangered Regent Honeyeater (*Anthochaera Phrygia*), Critically Endangered Scrub Turpentine (*Rhodamnia rubescens*) and Critically Endangered Variable Midge Orchid (*Genoplesium insigne*). Within the focus area there are also 18 Threatened Ecological Communities at risk including areas of Critically Endangered Kincumber Scribbly Gum Forest and Critically Endangered Hygrocybeae (Fungi) Ecological Communities. There are also 11 Save our Species (SoS) program sites at risk including the Swift Parrot (*Lathamus discolor*), Littlejohns Tree Frog (*Litoria littlejohni*) and the Giant Burrowing Frog (*Heleioporus Australiacus*).

There is a risk that bush fires could negatively impact on the cultural values of 10 Aboriginal sites and other cultural landscapes within the Focus area. There are also 23 local heritage sites at risk in the focus area including many early logging industry and town settlement buildings and sites across Cooranbong and Martinsville.

### Risk Profile Cooranbong to Martinsville (continued)

A key BFMC objective in the Cooranbong to Martinsville Focus Area is Community Preparedness. The BFMC aims to increase and improve people's awareness and understanding of their bush fire risk through advertising campaigns and engagement at local events. Treatments will encourage people to take action to prepare their home and property for bush fire through the maintenance of private property Asset Protection Zones and the preparation of bush fire survival plans.

As identified in the Fuel Management Register, The BFMC will maintain Asset Protection Zones and implement prescribed burning to achieve different fire management objectives including strategic fire protection, land management, and biodiversity management.

The BFMC will work to address the high number of deliberate and accidental bush fire ignitions with specific strategies relating to restricting access to bush fire prone land and patrolling at risk areas on days of elevated fire danger, as outlined in the BFMC Ignition Prevention Plan.

While every effort is made to maintain Asset Protection Zones and plan, prepare and conduct prescribed burning as described in the Fuel Management Register, the BFMC acknowledge that weather and environmental factors such as vegetation types, geography, presence of threatened flora and fauna, fire intervals and wildfires can impact time the frames and feasibility of delivering Fuel Management Objectives.

The key Bush Fire Risk Management Plan Objectives and Treatment Strategies for the Cooranbong to Martinsville Focus Area are listed in Table 3.

## Jilliby to Lemon Tree

### Risk Profile Jilliby to Lemon Tree

The Central Coast Bush Fire Management Committee (BFMC) has assessed the risk to residential, special fire protection (schools, health facilities, childcare etc.), economic, environmental and cultural assets and has identified Jilliby to Lemon Tree as a Focus Area.

The focus area encompasses the localities of Jilliby, Little Jilliby, Dooralong and Lemon Tree which are in the Dooralong Valley within the Central Coast Local Government Area. The Dooralong Valley is located west of the M1 Motorway Sparks Road Interchange and runs northwest into the Watagan Mountains. The Focus Area has a dispersed population of rural farms and larger lifestyle lots. Hue Hue Road runs along the west side of the M1 and the main access and egress for many residents in the Focus Area is via Dooralong Road and Jilliby Road.

The area has significant potential for rapid fire development with bushland surrounding the Valley including the Wyong State Forest and Jilliby Conservation area. Buttonderry Waste Management Facility is also within the Focus Area and has significant infrastructure and special site considerations if impacted by bush fire. A high severity bush fire event could impact on people, assets and local roads causing negative outcomes and major disruption in the area.

A number of residential homes, properties and economic assets (industrial, commercial and tourism) have been identified in the high risk category. There are also social vulnerability and demographic factors such as education levels, employment levels, car ownership and dwelling occupancy that may make the community more vulnerable to the impacts of bush fire.

The vegetation across the focus area is largely a mix of Dry Sclerophyll Forests and Wet Sclerophyll Forests, with Forested Wetlands, Temperate Rainforest and open managed grassland occurring in the valleys. No significant bush fires have occurred within the Focus Area in the last 10 years.

Bush fire is a key threatening process for many environmental assets. There is a risk that a high severity bush fire event in the area would cause serious damage or irreversible loss of habitat for 52 Threatened Species of fauna and flora including the Critically Endangered Scrub Turpentine (*Rhodamnia rubescens*) and the Critically Endangered Native Guava (*Rhodomyrtus psidioides*). Within the focus area there are also 15 Threatened Ecological Communities at risk including areas of Critically Endangered Kincumber Scribbly Gum. There are also 12 Save our Species (SoS) program sites at risk including the Swift Parrot (*Lathamus discolor*), Giant Burrowing Frog (*Heleioporus Australiacus*) and the Biconvex Paperbark (*Melaleuca biconvexa*).

There is a risk that bush fires could negatively impact on the cultural values of 11 Aboriginal sites and other cultural landscapes within the Focus Area. There are also 9 local heritage sites at risk in the focus area including early settlement buildings and locations.

### Risk Profile Jilliby to Lemon Tree (continued)

A key BFMC objective in the Jilliby to Lemon Tree Focus Area is Community Preparedness. The BFMC will aim to increase and improve people’s awareness and understanding of their bush fire risk through advertising campaigns, engagement at local events and community led initiatives. Treatments will encourage people to take action to prepare their home and property for bush fire through the maintenance of private property Asset Protection Zones and the preparation of bush fire survival plans.

As identified in the Fuel Management Register, The BFMC will implement prescribed burning to achieve different fire management objectives including strategic fire protection, land management, and biodiversity management.

To increase resilience within the focus area the BFMC will identify specific operational response strategies and develop pre incident plans for areas of concern as outlined in the BFMC Plan of Operations.

While every effort is made to plan, prepare and conduct prescribed burning as described in the Fuel Management Register, the BFMC acknowledge the weather and environmental factors such as vegetation types, geography, presence of threatened flora and fauna, fire intervals and nearby wildfires can impact the time frames and feasibility of delivering Fuel Management Objectives.

The key Bush Fire Risk Management Plan Objectives and Treatment Strategies for the Jilliby to Lemon Tree Focus Area are listed in Table 4.

## Ourimbah to Matcham

### Risk Profile Ourimbah to Matcham

The Central Coast Bush Fire Management Committee (BFMC) has assessed the risk to residential, special fire protection (schools, health facilities, childcare etc.), economic, environmental and cultural assets and has identified Ourimbah to Matcham as a Focus Area.

The Focus Area encompasses the suburbs of Ourimbah, Fountaindale, Glenning Valley, Lisarow, Tumbi Umbi, Mount Elliot, Holgate and Matcham which are in the Central Coast Local Government Area. Access and egress to the focus area is limited due to the topography of the area. Brush Road, Anderson Road, the Ridgeway, Paroo Road and Wattle Tree Road are the main through roads with numerous other single access and dead end roads leading to properties nestled in valleys and ridges across the Focus Area. The area has potential for rapid fire development which could cause negative outcomes for people, assets and local roads.

The vegetation across the focus area is predominantly Wet Sclerophyll forests, with some areas of Forested Wetlands and Temperate Rainforests. No significant bush fires have occurred in the Focus Area in the last 10 years.

A number of residential homes, properties and economic assets (industrial, commercial and tourism) have been identified in the very high risk category. There are also social vulnerability and demographic factors such as education levels, indigenous population, family structure and household income that may make the community more vulnerable to the impacts of bush fire.

Bush fire is a key threatening process for many environmental assets. There is a risk that a high severity bush fire event in the area would cause serious damage or irreversible loss of habitat for 86 Threatened Species of fauna and flora including the Critically Endangered Scrub Turpentine (*Rhodamnia rubescens*), the Critically Endangered Native Guava (*Rhodomyrtus psidioides*) and the Endangered Koala (*Phascolarctos cinereus*). Within the Focus Area there are also 7 Threatened Ecological Communities at risk including areas of Endangered Lowland Rainforest and Swamp Sclerophyll Forest. There are also 8 Save our Species (SoS) program sites at risk including the Swift Parrot (*Lathamus discolor*) and the Biconvex Paperbark (*Melaleuca biconvexa*).

There is a risk that bush fires could negatively impact on the cultural values of 14 Aboriginal sites and other cultural landscapes within the Focus Area including National Heritage listed Sydney Cultural Crescent Rock Art sites. There are also 8 local heritage sites at risk in the focus area including early settlement buildings.

### Risk Profile Ourimbah to Matcham (continued)

A key BFMC objective in the Ourimbah to Matcham Focus Area is Community Preparedness. The BFMC will aim to increase and improve people's awareness and understanding of their bush fire risk through advertising campaigns and engagement at local events. Treatments will encourage people to take action to prepare their home and property for bush fire through the maintenance of private property Asset Protection Zones and the preparation of bush fire survival plans.

As identified in the Fuel Management Register, The BFMC will maintain Asset Protection Zones and implement prescribed burning to achieve different fire management objectives including strategic fire protection, land management, and biodiversity management.

The BFMC will work to address the high number of deliberate and accidental bush fire ignitions with specific strategies relating to restricting access to bush fire prone land where appropriate and patrolling at risk areas on days of elevated fire danger as outlined in the BFMC Ignition Prevention Plan.

While every effort is made to maintain Asset Protection Zones and plan, prepare and conduct prescribed burning as described in the Fuel Management Register, the BFMC acknowledge that weather and environmental factors such as vegetation types, geography, presence of threatened flora and fauna, fire intervals and nearby wildfires can impact the time frames and feasibility of delivering Fuel Management Objectives.

The key Bush Fire Risk Management Plan Objectives and Treatment Strategies for the Ourimbah to Matcham Focus Area are listed in Table 5.

## Somersby to Peats Ridge

### Risk Profile Somersby to Peats Ridge

The Central Coast Bush Fire Management Committee (BFMC) has assessed the risk to residential, special fire protection (schools, health facilities, childcare etc.), economic, environmental and cultural assets and has identified Somersby to Peats Ridge as a Focus Area.

The Focus Area encompasses the suburbs of Somersby and Peats Ridge which are in the Central Coast Local Government Area. Somersby is located Northwest of Gosford and is a semi rural locality with farming and commercial industry. The M1 motorway connects to Wisemans Ferry Road and Peats Ridge Road which are the main access and egress to the area. Peats Ridge is located West of Somersby and has important local farming and lifestyle locations, with Brisbane Water National Park and the Mooney Mooney Creek Dam in between the two localities. The area has a history of bush fire ignition and there is potential for rapid fire development in bushland within and surrounding the Focus Area.

The vegetation across the focus area is largely a mix of Dry Sclerophyll Forests and Wet Sclerophyll Forests with some pockets of Forested Wetlands, Temperate Rainforests and open managed farm and grassland. Significant bush fires occurred in the Focus Area in 2018.

A number of residential homes, properties and economic assets (industrial, commercial and tourism) have been identified in the very high risk category. There are also social vulnerability and demographic factors of education levels, indigenous population, car ownership and dwelling occupancy levels that may make the community more vulnerable to the impacts of bush fire.

Bush fire is a key threatening process for many environmental assets. There is a risk that a high severity bush fire event in the area would cause serious damage or irreversible loss of habitat for 3 sites of Intergenerational Significance (AIS) declared for the Endangered Somersby Mintbush (*Prostanthera junonis*), 61 Threatened Species of fauna and flora including the Critically Endangered Scrub Turpentine (*Rhodamnia rubescens*) and the Endangered Koala (*Phascolarctos cinereus*) with part of the focus area falling within the Brisbane Water National Park Area of Regional Koala Significance (ARKS). Within the Focus Area there are also 8 Threatened Ecological Communities at risk including areas of Endangered Lowland Rainforest and Coastal Upland Swamp. There are also 17 Save our Species (SoS) program sites at risk including the Giant Burrowing Frog (*Heleioporus Australiacus*) and the *Grevillia shiressii* (*Grevillia shiressii*).

There is a risk that bush fires could negatively impact on the cultural values of 232 Aboriginal sites and other cultural landscapes within the Focus Area. There are also 11 local heritage sites at risk in the focus area including early logging industry sites and settlement buildings.

### Risk Profile Somersby to Peats Ridge (continued)

A key BFMC objective in the Somersby to Peats Ridge Focus Area is Community Preparedness. The BFMC will aim to increase and improve people’s awareness and understanding of their bush fire risk through advertising campaigns and engagement at local events. Treatments will encourage people to take action to prepare their home and property for bush fire through the maintenance of private property Asset Protection Zones and the preparation of bush fire survival plans.

As identified in the Fuel Management Register, the BFMC will maintain Asset Protection Zones and implement prescribed burning to achieve different fire management objectives including strategic fire protection, land management, and biodiversity management.

To increase resilience within the Focus Area the BFMC will identify specific operational response strategies and maintain and develop pre incident plans for areas of concern as outlined in the BFMC Plan of Operations.

While every effort is made to maintain Asset Protection Zones and plan, prepare and conduct prescribed burning as described in the Fuel Management Register, the BFMC acknowledge that weather and environmental factors such as vegetation types, geography, presence of threatened flora and fauna, fire intervals and nearby wildfires can impact the time frames and feasibility of delivering Fuel Management Objectives.

## Mount White to Calga

### Risk Profile Mount White to Calga

The Central Coast Bush Fire Management Committee (BFMC) has assessed the risk to residential, special fire protection (schools, health facilities, childcare etc.), economic, environmental and cultural assets and has identified Mount White to Calga as a Focus Area.

The Focus Area encompasses the suburbs of Mount White, Calga, Glenworth Valley, Wendoree Park and Marlow which are in the Central Coast Local Government Area. Mount White and Calga are primarily semi-rural farmland and bushland including areas of National Park and have a higher population with better road access via the Old Pacific Highway and Peats Ridge Road. The Glenworth Valley area is an isolated recreational area often with a highly transient tourist population. Marlow and Wendoree Park are both small isolated river communities with single narrow access roads. These communities front Mangrove Creek and the Hawkesbury river, with boat only access to some properties. The area has a history of bush fire ignition and significant potential for rapid fire development within bushland surrounding and within the Focus Area.

The vegetation across the Focus Area is largely a mix of Dry Sclerophyll Forests and Wet Sclerophyll Forests with some pockets of Forested Wetlands, Saline and Freshwater Wetlands, Temperate Rainforest and open managed farm and grassland. No significant bush fires have occurred in the Focus Area within the last 10 years.

A number of residential homes, properties and economic assets (industrial, commercial and tourism) have been identified in the very high risk category. There are also social vulnerability and demographic factors such as household income levels, education levels, family structure and household growth that may make the community more vulnerable to the impacts of bush fire.

Bush fire is a key threatening process for many environmental assets. There is a risk that a high severity bush fire event in the area would cause serious damage or irreversible loss of habitat for 30 Threatened Species of fauna and flora including the Critically Endangered Scrub Turpentine (*Rhodamnia rubescens*), the Critically Endangered Regent Honeyeater (*Anthochaera Phrygia*) and State Environmental Planning Policy (SEPP) listed Coastal Wetlands. Within the Focus Area there are also 8 Threatened Ecological Communities at risk including areas of Endangered Swamp Oak Floodplain forest and Coastal Upland Swamp. There are also 12 Save our Species (SoS) program sites at risk including the Giant Burrowing Frog (*Heleioporus Australiacus*) and the Spreading Guinea Flower (*Hibbertia procumbens*).

There is a risk that bush fires could negatively impact on the cultural values of 278 Aboriginal sites and other cultural landscapes within the Focus Area including the Calga Aboriginal Cultural Landscape which is State Heritage Listed. There are also 6 local heritage sites at risk in the Focus Area including early settlement buildings and sites.

### Risk Profile Mount White to Calga (continued)

A key BFMC objective in the Mount White to Calga Focus Area is Community Preparedness. The BFMC will aim to increase and improve people’s awareness and understanding of their bush fire risk through advertising campaigns and engagement at local events. Treatments will encourage people to take action to prepare their home and property for bush fire through the maintenance of private property Asset Protection Zones and the preparation of bush fire survival plans.

As identified in the Fuel Management Register, the BFMC will maintain Asset Protection Zones and implement prescribed burning to achieve different fire management objectives including strategic fire protection, land management, and biodiversity management.

While every effort is made to maintain Asset Protection Zones and plan, prepare and conduct prescribed burning as described in the Fuel Management Register, the BFMC acknowledge that weather and environmental factors such as vegetation types, geography, presence of threatened flora and fauna, fire intervals and nearby wildfires can impact the time frames and feasibility of delivering Fuel Management Objectives.

The key Bush Fire Risk Management Plan Objectives and Treatment Strategies for the Mount White to Calga Focus Area are listed in Table 7.

## Phegans Bay to Pearl Beach

### Risk Profile Phegans Bay to Pearl Beach

The Central Coast Bush Fire Management Committee (BFMC) has assessed the risk to residential, special fire protection (schools, health facilities, childcare etc.), economic, environmental and cultural assets and has identified Phegans Bay to Pearl Beach as a Focus Area.

The Focus Area encompasses the suburbs of Pearl Beach, Umina Beach, Woy Woy, Horsfield Bay, Phegans Bay and Woy Woy Bay which are in the Central Coast Local Government Area. The area has a diverse population with a mix of urban sprawl and coastal hamlets. Pearl Beach is an isolated hamlet to the south of Umina. The fringes of Umina's residential area extend west into the high escarpment with large areas of bushland interface. Horsfield Bay, Phegans Bay and Woy Woy Bay are small hamlet communities north of Umina on the West side of Woy Woy Bay. The area has a history of bush fire ignition and significant potential for rapid fire development within bushland to the west of the focus area.

Access and egress to the area is limited with no road access to the area from the south or west. Woy Woy Road and Brisbane Water Drive are the only main roads to the north, and Maitland Bay Drive leading to the Rip Bridge in the east. There is a risk that a high severity bush fire event in the area would impact on these vital road links and cut off large numbers of people causing congestion. The vegetation across the focus area is largely a mix of Dry Sclerophyll Forests, Coastal Heath and Wet Sclerophyll Forests with some pockets of Forested Wetlands. Significant bush fires have occurred in the focus area in 2016, 2017 and 2021.

A number of residential homes, properties and economic assets (industrial, commercial and tourism) have been identified in the very high risk category. There are also social vulnerability and demographic factors such as education levels, indigenous population, age, family structure and assistance levels that may make the community more vulnerable to the impacts of bush fire.

Bush fire is a key threatening process for many environmental assets. There is a risk that a high severity bush fire event in the area would cause serious damage or irreversible loss of habitat for 49 Threatened Species of fauna and flora including the Critically Endangered Native Guava (*Rhodomyrtus psidioides*), the Endangered Koala (*Phascolarctos cinereus*) with part of the Focus Area falling within the Brisbane Water National Park Area of Regional Koala Significance (ARKS) and State Environmental Planning Policy (SEPP) listed Coastal Wetlands. Within the Focus Area there are also 20 Threatened Ecological Communities at risk including areas of Critically Endangered Kincumber Scribbly Gum Forest and Critically Endangered Hygrocybeae (Fungi) Ecological Communities. There are also 17 Save our Species (SoS) program sites at risk including the Stuttering Frog (*Mixophyes balbus*), Little Tern (*Sternula albifrons*) and the Spreading Guinea Flower (*Hibbertia procumbens*).

There is a risk that bush fires could negatively impact on the cultural values of 61 Aboriginal sites and other cultural landscapes within the Focus Area. There are also 13 local heritage sites at risk in the Focus Area including early settlement buildings and sites.

### Risk Profile Phegans Bay to Pearl Beach (continued)

A key BFMC objective in the Phegans Bay to Pearl Beach Focus Area is Community Preparedness. The BFMC will aim to increase and improve people’s awareness and understanding of their bush fire risk through advertising campaigns and engagement at local events. Treatments will encourage people to take action to prepare their home and property for bush fire through the maintenance of private property Asset Protection Zones and the preparation of bush fire survival plans.

To facilitate effective community responses during emergency events, BFMC agencies will work to provide timely public information during and after bush fire or other emergencies through provision of field liaison officers, Emergency alert warnings, Radio and social media updates and community meetings.

As identified in the Fuel Management Register, The BFMC will maintain Asset Protection Zones and implement prescribed burning to achieve different fire management objectives including strategic fire protection, Land management, and biodiversity management.

The BFMC will work to address the high number of deliberate and accidental bush fire ignitions with specific strategies outlined in the BFMC Ignition Prevention Plan.

While every effort is made to maintain Asset Protection Zones and plan, prepare and conduct prescribed burning as described in the Fuel Management Register, the BFMC acknowledge that weather and environmental factors such as vegetation types, geography, presence of threatened flora and fauna, fire intervals and r nearby wildfires can impact the time frames and feasibility of delivering Fuel Management Objectives.

The key Bush Fire Risk Management Plan Objectives and Treatment Strategies for the Phegans Bay to Pearl Beach Focus Area are listed in Table 8.
